

FIRST
YEAR

- Begin lower-division HAVC courses (numbered 10-99)
- Strengthen writing skills and broaden general education
- Consider taking language courses (recommended for study abroad and/or graduate studies)
- Build relationships with faculty members. Meet with faculty during office hours. Introduce yourself, share your interests, ask them about their research, and get guidance on how to make the most of the educational opportunities available to you.

SECOND
YEAR

- Complete additional lower-division HAVC requirements
- 100A (recommended)
- Begin upper-division HAVC courses (numbered 101-191)
- **Declare the HAVC major**
- Meet with your faculty adviser to discuss your goals and interests in the major. Ask about research opportunities, scholarships, careers, and graduate school.
- Visit the Global Engagement office and explore options to study abroad.
- Learn about HAVC internship opportunities and consider doing an internship.

THIRD
YEAR

- 100A (if not completed in second year)
- Continue upper-division HAVC courses
- Education Abroad Program?
- Apply to the Creative Entrepreneurship Internship (CEI) program or other internships.
- Research graduate programs and email the departments.
- Look up sample grad school application timelines and develop a personal deadline.
- Assess which exams you must take for graduate school (GRE, LSAT, GMAT).

FOURTH
YEAR

- Complete upper-division HAVC courses
- Complete senior comprehensive
- Graduation check with HAVC undergraduate adviser fall quarter
- Consider doing an internship.
- Meet with two or three faculty who can write letters of recommendation for you.
- Take your required graduate exam(s) and apply to graduate programs.
- Email professionals in your interested career field. Inquire about internships and jobs.
